

Open Standard for Doc Formats Checklist

- Fully published and available freely or at nominal charge
- IPR irrevocably available on <u>royalty-free basis</u>
- Developed, approved and maintained by an <u>open organization</u> in <u>inclusive</u>, transparent process
- Fully implemented in multiple, competing products
- Interoperable on multiple platforms and applications
- Other "open" standards: TCP/IP, HTML


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OPEN DOCUMENT FORMAT

ODF ALLIANCE

- Open: Only open, ISO-approved XML-based specification for displaying and storing data files – text (.odt), spreadsheets (.ods), presentations (.odp)
- Vendor-Neutral:Not dominated or tied to a single vendor
- Innovative & Feature-Rich: Evolving to meet market needs: accessibility (v1.1); digital signature, metadata, formula (v1.2)
- Future-Proof: Perpetual access to document irrespective of application creating it
- Interoperable: Supported in 50+ applications including OpenOffice, Google Docs, Koffice, IBM Symphony, StarOffice, Adobe Buzzword, Zoho, AbiWord
- Preferred by Government:
 Recommended or required for use
 by 17 national and 8 provincial
 governments

ODF— Gaining Control of Your Own Documents & Records



Old Proprietary Style

- Documents are "locked in" to the application that created them..
- Control is with the software developer not the customer.

New Open Standards Style

- Documents are "freed" by using open standards.
- Multiple applications can create and access documents interchangeably.
- Customers are in control not the software provider.

ODF's Future

- ISO/IEC 26.300 standard was based on ODF 1.0
- Current most updated version approved by OASIS is 1.1 (accessibility)
- Version 1.2 (new features):
 - Metadata: RDF/XML and OWL (Web Ontology Language)
 - <u>Digital Signature</u>:XMLDSig, extensible using XADES (ETSI)
 - OpenFormula: http://wiki.oasis-open.org/office/About_OpenFormula
- OASIS ODF Interop & Conformance TC (OIC)
 - <u>"Plugfest</u>": The Hague (June 2009) and Orvieto, Italy (Nov 2009)

ODF, Open Standards and Open Source

Open source


Open source is actual software **code** defined by its collaborative development, accessibility of code, and distribution: shared/distributed freely; licensed on non-discriminatory basis to allow use, modification, reproduction; and peer reviewed. Relies on open standards to achieve interoperability.

Open standards

Blueprints enabling interoperability among diverse applications, platforms, and devices. No individual or company controls the standard.

Open document formats


An example of an open standard, used for displaying and storing data files that can be implemented by any developer; encourages multiple competing implementations on multiple platforms; enables long-term independent of application.

- Open standards are critical for emergency preparedness
- When the tsunami struck Thailand, its government and responding domestic and international agencies were unable to share information because each used different data and document formats




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ODF Adoption

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Microsoft & ODF: 5th year and still a work in progress

- 1 May 2005 ODF approved as OASIS standard
- 22 September 2005 Massachusetts adopts ODF, other governments follow
- 21 November 2005 MS will not support ODF; instead announces it will submit its own XML-based format, OOXML, to Ecma for standardization
- 2 May 2006 ODF approved as int'l standard (ISO/IEC 26300:2006)
- 6 July 2006 MS announces support for development of OOXML-ODF Translator
- 30 Nov 2006 MS makes OOXML default format in release of Office 2007
- 21 May 2008 "Native" support for ODF in Service Pack 2 for Office 2007 announced
- 22 May 2008 European Commission announces investigation of whether MS's announced support for ODF leads to better interoperability/choice
- 28 April 2009 SP2 for MS Office 2007 with ODF support released
 - -strips out spreadsheet formula
 - -no change-tracking
 - -no password-protection
 - -no support in Office 2003 or its predecessors
- 24 July 2009 MS Proposed Public Undertaking to European Commission on Interoperability, including ODF

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OpenDocument Best Practices

Free Your Documents In Three Easy Steps

- -Take control of the default format
- -Enable ODF support
- -Exercise your right to choose a native ODF editor

Advice for governments/public sector

- -Establish policies for openness to promote interoperability, competition and choice
- -Run pilots to explore the implementation of ODF-supporting applications
- -Adopt government policies that require open standards for file formats
- -Require support for open standards in future government software procurement
- -Secure top-level support
- -Buy-in of power users
- -Don't convert templates
